

Attend a lecture on home safety given by a fire department or home insurance may be obtained. Talk about the things that can make a home unsafe and how to correct them.

Do a safety check in your home using the home safety checklist. If you find safety hazards, encourage your parents to have them corrected. EXTRA MILE SERVICE: With the permission of your corps officer or pastor, do a safety check at your corps or church.

Know what to do to be prepared if a fire starts in your home.

- a. Plan two exit routes from each room in your home. Arrange a meeting place outside so you will know when everyone is safe. If possible, conduct a fire drill with your family.
- b. Demonstrate what to do if a person's clothing is on fire.
- c. Know how to report a fire.

Our world is not perfect. There are some people in the world who harm other people. We need to know how to avoid dangerous situations.

Attend a lecture by a law-enforcement officer about how to keep yourself safe from crimes of opportunity.



Read a book or magazine article about self-defense or how to avoid becoming the victim of a crime of opportunity. Share what you learn with your troop.

We all like to feel physically secure and protected. As Christians we need to be protective of our spiritual life, just as we are of our physical bodies. Ephesians 6:13-17 names the armor a soldier of Jesus Christ may use for protection from the attacks of Satan. Using this Scripture, write questions for a news interview with the soldier, asking about the armor. Present the interview for your troop or some other group.

Make up the dialogue, design costumes and equipment, and create the proper atmosphere for the interview. You may leave the story in the time period in which it was written or change it to the present day. The main point to convey is that, just as we learn to protect our physical body, we can learn from God and His Word how to protect our spiritual self.

After your visit, list some of the new things you learned.

Visit a public business facility such as a camp, restaurant, child care center, hospital, etc. Find out what regulations are enforced by the state and local boards of health. Find out how the proper levels of sanitation demanded by the community are maintained in the facility. What happens if the facility fails to meet the standards?

After your visit, discuss as a group: Are the regulations too demanding, about right, or not demanding enough? would happen if the regulations did not exist?

Visit a substance-abuse facility. Find out what services are provided and how someone can receive help. If you cannot visit a facility, ask your leader to invite a substance abuse expert to come and speak with your group. This could be a counselor, physician, minister, social worker, member of a narcotic or alcohol recovery group, or law enforcement representative. It would be good if two people could come at the same time. This would give the group a chance to see how the subject is seen from two points of view.




Brainstorm* with your group about things that cannot be cured with drugs, such as a bad report card, a flat tire and a rainy weekend.

After you have listed about 20 things, discuss what can be done to help with each difficult situation.

(*Brainstorm means to make a long list of ideas very quickly. Everyone talks at the same time while one person writes down each idea on a chalkboard. No one stops to criticize or question another person's idea.)










