REQUIREMENT #1 - Creative Art

Through the years many men and women have searched for ways to communicate through art. Some have become famous and others have gone unrecognized.

Art is used to communicate many different messages. Sometimes it is used to advertise products like the design on a soda can or a message on a billboard. Paintings and photographs have been used for political reasons especially during wars and elections. Even before cameras, artists were hired to paint portraits of kings and queens and, in doing so, recorded history in their work.

Look around the room and find five specific examples of art that is being used to communicate a message.

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
Colors

Many times artists use art to create a feeling in a person or to express a feeling of their own through their work. Pablo Picasso was one of these artists. He went through some tough times in his life during which he painted using only certain colors.

Lines



A wrinkle on a grandma's face, the design in a piece of wood, the interlocking mesh in a basketball net, even the fingerprints on your thumb are all examples of lines. Lines help to create composition, form, movement, and shading in artwork. Today we are exposed to many very simple forms of line design that perhaps we tend to overlook.



Have you ever noticed that as you move away from an object, it seems to get smaller? When drawing, this optical illusion is achieved by *linear perspective*. When drawing a set of railroad tracks, a point is set where the tracks seem to disappear into the page. That

point is called the *vanishing point*. The vanishing point is on the *horizon* - the imaginary line where the sky appears to touch the ground.

To experiment with linear perspective, on a separate sheet of paper try to draw this picture:

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REQUIREMENT #2 - Local Museum or Art Gallery

Take a trip to the local museum or art gallery. Spend some time looking up some of the artists that have made an impact in our world throughout history and still today. Find a different artist for each of the following types of art and on a separate sheet of paper, record their names and the pieces of art you saw:

- Portrait: a picture of someone.
- Sculpture: a ceramic, stone, or clay form, like a statue.
- Landscape: a scene of the country, lake or mountains.
- Religious: events in the life of Christ, early church or related theme.
- War: battles and heroes were recorded by numerous artists.
- Find a painting that makes you feel sad, happy, angry or scared.

If a museum or art gallery is not available in your area, your local library may be a good alternative.

REQUIREMENT #3 - Creative Art Projects

For this requirement, complete two of the following creative art projects (or two other art projects approved by your leader):

Piñata

Piñatas are fun and simple to make. To make a figure or animal, use balloons to help shape the body. Inflate the balloons and tape them together for your desired shape. Cover the piñata with papier mache' - two to three layers - and let the piñata dry.

Tape pieces of cardboard for legs, arms, wings, ears, etc. as required. Cover the piñata with papier mache' where you have added these parts - two to three layers - and let the piñata dry.

After the piñata is the desired shape and is completely dry, cut a hole in the back to remove the balloon(s) and to add candy or party favors (not too many or the weight will break the piñata). Papier mache' over the hole.

The last step is to add tissue paper and other colors for decoration.

Collage

Choose your favorite athlete, actor or recreational activity and create a collage on poster board using pictures from magazines and newspapers.

Water Color Painting



Create your own water color painting on any subject and in any style (portrait, landscape, abstract, etc.).

Sponge Painting or Stamping

Create a piece of art using sponge painting or stamping. You may use rubber stamps, or make your own potato stamps by carving a design in a potato.

Ceramics


Here you either make your own ceramic animal or design from scratch using modeling clay, or purchase a pre-made ceramic figure from an arts and crafts store and paint it with acrylic paint.


Mobile or Stabile Space Designs

Mobile space designs are objects that move while stabile space designs are objects that stay in place. They are called space designs because they have spaces between the parts.

To make a simple mobile, use cardboard or heavy paper and cut a 4" x 24" strip. Glue the ends together to make a circle. Make holes around the bottom edge of the circle and tie strings of various lengths to the holes. Design objects of different shapes and sizes and tie them to the strings. Make four holes at the top of the cardboard circle, attach equal lengths of string to each hole and loop the other ends together at the top. Attach the top to a fixture for hanging. You may want to experiment with various materials and designs.

Stabiles may be made by using a clay base and sticking various objects into it to form a sculpture.





REQUIREMENT #4 - God is the Ultimate Creator

Art is a creation process, taking raw materials and objects and making them into something new. In Genesis chapters 1 and 2 we have an account of the events that took place as God conducted the ultimate creation, when He created the world and everything in it.

God is the ultimate creator. He is the master of design. Who else could splash the sky with the colors of sunset? Who else could form the ever changing shape of clouds drifting up above? Who else could create the majestic flight of an eagle soaring through it all?
