REQUIREMENT #1 - Salvation Army Terms and Programs

REQUIREMENT #2 - Corps Officer Interview

REQUIREMENT #3 - Senior Soldier Interviews

Interview two adult senior soldiers and on a separate sheet of paper record their answers to the following questions:

- When did you join The Salvation Army?
- What does being a Salvationist mean to you?
- What do you like most about The Salvation Army?

Share your findings with your leader and fellow Explorers.

REQUIREMENT #4 - Corps History Report

It is important to know your family history in order to understand where you come from and why things are the way they are. To understand your corps, you need to know its history.

Write a brief history report of your corps. Your report should include the following information:

- Year the corps was established
- Listing of all commanding officers
- Building addresses
- Famous people who may have attended
- Major events and activities

You may want to make a scrap-book showing newspaper clippings, photos, etc. Ask your corps officer to assist you. Also contact divisional headquarters for any information they may have.

This requirement may be done on your own, but makes an excellent group project. Your leader will determine how it is to be completed.

REQUIREMENT #5 - Service

Service is an important part of The Salvation Army. Ask your corps officer what the "S" stands for on The Salvation Army uniform.

What does it stand for?						



Volunteer at least two hours of service for one of the following (or similar) programs at the corps:

League of Mercy Visitation Corps Maintenance

Sunday School Visitation Christmas Assistance

OR

Visit a Salvation Army center outside the corps, such as:

Divisional Headquarters Adult Rehabilitation Center

Homeless Shelter Thrift Store

REQUIREMENT #6 - Sunday Meeting Participation

For this requirement you must participate in a Sunday service at the corps.

It may be as part of a group presentation, saying a prayer, leading a song, reading Scripture or giving a testimony. Your leader will work with the corps officer to provide the right opportunity for you and your Explorer section to take part in a service.

Something to Think About

During this emblem we have looked at the corps being like our families - made up of different people, programs and parts. God's Word talks about the Church as being a body with many parts but one goal.

Read 1 Corinthians 12:12-27.

How does this relate to your corps?

Your corps is part of the body of Christ with many different parts, working together to bring glory and honor to God. Read the passage again, but this time replace the word *body* with the word *corps*.

Discuss this Scripture with your Explorer section and leader.
